Making Your Device Work for You: Accessibility for your devices (Smartphones, Tablets, and Computers)

Today, most devices have accessibility features that can make it easier to do tasks. These features can be found in the accessibility setting.

	Common Accessibility Features
Help Seeing	 Your device can make things on the screen bigger or read things aloud. Examples: Screen Readers Magnifier (Windows) Narrator (Windows)
Help Speaking	 Your device can read the words you type aloud. Examples: Text-to-Speech Live Speech (Apple)
Help Hearing	 Your device can help you understand conversations. Examples: Closed Caption Headphone Accommodations (Apple)
Help Moving Your Body	 You can control your device with your voice or special switches. Your device also has features that make it easier to use a keyboard. Examples: Word Prediction Sticky Keys (Windows) Voice Access (Android)



- Your device can help you stay focused on a task. You can choose how apps look.
